The authoring service costs \$20 per question with a minimum charge of \$500. To use the service you must own or purchase Question Mark for Windows software to run the questions and process the answers. ▲

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UC Irvine Beta Tests QM Web Interactive

Imagine using the same software for on-site quizzes, course evaluations and distance learning exams – all via the Internet. The Graduate School of Management of the University of California at Irvine is now Beta testing QM Web Interactive with the goal of using it for all these activities and possibly more. The new software enables users to get on-line feedback on the Internet.

Students of economics at UCI's Graduate School of Management enter one of three state-of-the-art "electronic classrooms" with their laptop computers, which they use to take Question Mark quizzes

at the end of each lecture. Because they are on the Internet as well as a local area network, the students can all take the same test regardless of what type of laptop they use. With 60 people in any one class, response times on the school's local area network would be too slow, so the quizzes are marked via QM Web Interactive. Less than a second after finishing each test, students can see all wrong answers on their screens, and the computer explains what the

right answer should have been. Lecturers at the school say students love the instant feedback.

This is just the start for QM Interactive at UCI. The management school also hopes to allow people on distance education MBAs to take quizzes and tests via the Internet, and the School of Management has already wired an electronic classroom at the Hyatt Newporter Hotel in Newport Beach as part of its executive MBA program for health care professionals. Course evaluations will also be done using Question Mark instead of paper questionnaires.

According to Tony Zamanian, Database Administrator/Director of Administrative Computing for the School of Management, Question Mark has the potential to transform the way educators regard tests.

"This will completely change the way we use tests," says Tony. "We are starting to look at tests as learning tools in a very active sense of the word. For example, you might want to run students through a test just as a means of letting them know what's going to be expected of them. Instant feedback will give them an idea of their strengths and weaknesses and put them on the right track for studying the material. Then, a few weeks later they can come back to the

same test – or one with similar but not identical questions – with a better mastery of the material."

In addition to Question Mark testing, UC Irvine has implemented many other practical steps to enhance learning. Peter Navarro, Associate Professor of Public Policy, feels that all of these steps enhance the educational experience in an environmentally and humanly friendly way. Here is his explanation of some of the major things that are happening at the Graduate School of Management, which boasts one of the most sophisticated and well-equipped computer labs in the country.

1. Information Transfer: There is no paper in class. All information, whether from teacher to student or vice versa, is transferred digitally off the class Web page. The syllabus, class notes or graphic presentations are posted as files on the Web page. Students then download them into their computers. Assignments are "handed in" in the same way.

2. No More Blackboards: All lectures are accompanied by animated, colorful visual presentations using PowerPoint software. The laptop is hooked up to the classroom's color video projector. The instructor has a remote control device to advance the "slides" from anywhere in the room. This visual aid helps students better remember what the professor is saying. Students can also follow along on their own computer with their own copy of the presentation. They take notes right on the electronic file. Again, no paper is involved.

3. No More Office Hours: Professors no longer meet with students unless requested. There is a "virtual office" in cyberspace, which students can regularly visit. This office was built using the "Chat Room" feature of Netscape. During "office hours" students log into the chat room and direct questions to the professor. There is a loss of face-to-face contact and that's a negative. However, the virtual office increases student participation. It's more convenient to visit with the professor on the Net than it is to commute to campus.

4. Cruising the Net: To enhance discussions about economics and public policy, relevant newspaper articles can be accessed right on the Internet. Then, using Groupsys, an opinion polling software, the professor can benchmark student attitudes on any given issue, such as balancing the budget. Students can graphically see how their attitudes may change during the discussion as they acquire more information.

PRACTICAL POINTERS

Some answers to our readers' latest queries from the Question Mark™ technical team.

Q: *I have a large number of question files. What is the best way to browse them?*

A: Use the Associate option in Windows Files Manager to associate .QDT files with PRESENT.EXE. Then you can view your questions simply by double clicking on the file within File Manager.

Q: *If I already have questions in text files, can I transfer them into Question Mark?*

A: Yes. Windows has a built in "Copy and Paste" mechanism. Copy text from an existing document to the clipboard and then paste it into a question. If you are going to use similar text more than once, in feedback messages for instance, use copy and paste and

then amend the text. Remember that copy and paste works throughout Windows - in filename edit boxes, etc. You can copy text from DOS programs as well. Press Alt-Enter to put the program in a DOS window, then select Edit from the system menu.

Q: *What advice would you have for a beginning Question Mark user in regard to layout and style?*

A: Don't try too hard to make impressive question layouts. Use only one font, a maximum of three or four sizes,

and a limited range of colors. Use the Question Editor grid to keep the layout clean. Start with the grid at Coarse to lay out the components, and then reduce the grid to Medium or Fine for the finishing touches. Don't be afraid to experiment with question layouts. Then, when you have decided which layouts you like, stick with them. To

do this, make your own layout with an explanation question type and then "Save as Style." Change the question type, then save again. Repeat this for each question type, giving each question a brief description before saving as style. Every time you create a new question, use one of your own styles to create a consistent layout. This will keep

QM Welcomes Canadian Endorsement

Jim Baird and Greg Johnson were discouraged!

They had been searching for testing software that they could use in their own college and also combine with some computer based training courseware that they were creating. Unhappy with existing courseware, they were developing new courseware in partnership with Humber College in Toronto, Ontario, one of the largest community colleges in Canada. new testing software.


In an interview with Greg and Jim, Greg commented, "As education goes digital and on-line authoring software becomes critical in the development of computer based learning, Question Mark is a true test authoring program that should be part of any teaching/learning development environment." 5. Audio, Video and CD-Rom Applications:

These are the low-tech applications. Lectures are recorded on audio cassettes so students can listen to them outside the classroom. This is popular with students with longer commutes and with foreign students. In the future, there will also be a video version of each lecture. Eventually, the audio and video material will be packaged as a CD-ROM, enhancing the school's remote access teaching capability.

"We have only begun to tap the potential of the electronic classroom," says Professor Navarro. "Professors are constantly looking for new applications to try and most are convinced that the computer can be a powerful classroom tool."
